

### Lesson 20

## **Jacob the Deceiver**

### Genesis chapters 26 and 27

#### **Memory Verse**

"And he came near, and kissed him: and he smelled the smell of his raiment, and blessed him, and said, See, the smell of my son is as the smell of a field which the Lord hath blessed."

Genesis 27.27

#### Jacob, a Deceiver, Saved by Grace

It is amazing that we read the name of Jacob in Hebrews 11: "By faith Jacob, when he was a dying, blessed both the sons of Joseph; and worshipped, leaning upon the top of his staff" (Hebrews 11:21). Why is it an amazing thing? It is amazing because, when we look back at the life of Jacob, we do n ot find a man who walks perfectly according to God's law. What we find in Genesis 27 is a man who went to great lengths to deceive his father, Isaac, in order to obtain the blessing.

Rebekah, hearing about Isaac's desire to bless Esau, conspired to deceive her husband. When she tells Jacob of her plan, he has concerns, but not upright concerns. He is not concerned about the deception, but only of being found out: "My faither peradventure will feel me, and I shall seem to him as a deceiver; and I shall bring a curse upon me, and not a blessing" (Genesis 27:12). How much better it would have been if he had had God before his eyes! Then, with Joseph, he would have said, "How then can I do this great wickedness, and sin against God?" (Genesis 39:9). Children, many times people avoid evil because they fear the consequences. How much better when we avoid sin because we have the honor and glory of God before our eyes.

How is it that God could look mercifully upon a person like Jacob? It was possible because a man is not considered righteous before God by works. If God looked for a person who was righteous by himself, he would find no one. Thankfully, the salvation of God is not predicated upon works, but it is received only by faith in Jesus Christ, and that is because of grace.

#### **Christ: The Christian's Righteousness**

Although Jacob received the blessing through deception, in this narrative is revealed the way a sinner receives the blessing of God through Jesus Christ. Let us consider the following:

1) If Jacob had come before his father as he was, he would never have received a blessing. Jacob

acknowledged as juch, when he said, if he was known to be Jacob, he would have received a "curse."

- All mankind came under the curse of the law when our covenant head, Adam, fell in sin.
- 2) Before Isaac would bless, he required that an animal be slain.
- Jesus Christ died the death of the cross to satisfy the just demands of God's law.
- 3) In order to be blessed, Jacvob must come in the appearance of Esau. In order to affect this, he covered himself with the skins of the flosk. Isaac, touching and smelling his son, is satisfied.
- The favor of God is obtainable only through the righteousness of Jesus Christ. When a repenting sinner turns to God by faith, God sees that sinner not as he is, but he sees him through his Son.
- 4) Isaac smelled Jacob and was satisfied.
- Jesus Christ, "who is even at the right hand of God...maketh intercession for us" (Romans 8:34). When Christ intercedes on behalf of a sinner before his Father, the Father is satisfied.
