

Lesson 30

Let My People Go

The Book of Exodus, chapters 5 through 11

Memory Verse

"And I have also heard the groaning of the children of Israel, whom the Egyptians keep in bondage; and I have remembered my covenant."

Exodus 6:5

The Wicked and the Word of the Lord

The wicked are like Pharaoh, they do not respect the Word of the Lord. When Moses had come to Pharaoh, he told Pharaoh that the LORD had spoken to him, and that Pharaoh was to let the people of Israel go and worship the Lord. How did Pharaoh react? Did he humble himself before the Word of the Lord? No, Pharaoh doubted the Word of the Lord: "Who is the LORD, that I should obey his voice to let Israel go?" (Exodus 5:2).

There are a people to whom the Word of the Lord is a sweet sound: "How sweet are thy words unto my taste! yea, sweeter than honey to my mouth!" (Psalm 119:103). However, it is not a sweet word to everyone. To those who love themselves and the things of the world, to those who love to dwell in the tents of wickedness (Psalm 84:10), the Word of the Lord is not a sweet word. No, to them it is something far different. To them, the Word of the Lord is an empty word. What did Pharaoh say to the taskmasters? "Let them not regard vain words" (Exodus 5:9).

Pharaoh may have thought the Word of the Lord was a vain word, but he was mistaken. It was the words of Pharaoh that were vain. How many times did he say, "I will not let the people go?" Yet in the end, he had to let them go. The Almighty was too much for Pharaoh. Pharaoh's word failed. God's word endured.

The Servant Not Above the Master

Pharaoh hated the Word of the Lord that Moses spoke to him. His hatred is seen, not only in his disobedience to the Word of the Lord, but also in the increased burdens that he placed upon the children of Jacob. "Take away their straw; let them get their own straw, but do not diminish the number of bricks they must make." Pharaoh hates the Word of the Lord, so he hates the people of the Lord.

It is a sad reality in this world that people are persecuted. It is a clear sign of the fall, and mankind's depraved nature. Sometimes people may be persecuted because they look different, or because they come from a different ethnic group. Sometimes people are persecuted because they

are children of God.

Although no one likes to be persecuted, Christians should not be surprised when they are persecuted. Jesus said to his disciples, "If they have persecuted me," (and they did persecute him, even unto the death of the cross), "they will also persecute you" (John 15:20). Persecution for God's sake is not a cause to despair. In fact, Jesus said the exact opposite: "Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 5:10).

Jesus Christ, the Greater Moses

God sent Moses to deliver his people from bondage in Egypt. Moses' task was not easy. Although what Moses accomplished, by grace, was remarkable, it pales in comparison to what Jesus Christ, the great Moses, accomplished.

- 1) Pharaoh set his will against Moses' commission. Satan and the world set themselves against Christ's commission.
- 2) Despite all the efforts of Pharaoh, he had to let the Hebrew children go. Despite the efforts of the devil, Jesus Christ gained the victory over death, hell, and the grave.
- 3) Moses was sent to deliver the Hebrew children from an earthly bondage. God sent his Son into the world to deliver his people from a greater bondage, the bondage of sin.
- 4) With very few exceptions, those who were delivered from Egypt never made it to the promised land, Canaan. This was because of their rebellion. All those who are delivered from the bondage of sin, by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, are reconciled to the Father, have their entire debt paid, and have everlasting life. Their salvation is assured.
