Lesson 32

God's Patience with a Complaining People

The Book of Exodus, chapters 14 through 17

Memory Verse

"Then sang Moses and the children of Israel this song unto the LORD, and spake, saying, I will sing unto the LORD, for he hath triumphed gloriously: the horse and his rider hath he thrown into the sea. The LORD is my strength and son, and he is become my salvation: he is my God, and I will prepare him an habitation; my father's God, and I will exalt him."

Exodus 12:13

A Hard Heart Forgets God's Judgments

There is no clearer evidence of the need for the Spirit's work upon the heart than Pharaoh. Repeatedly, Egypt came under the severe judgments of God. It was only after the tenth plague that Pharaoh relented and let the Hebrew people go. Was Pharaoh's heart changed? Was he humbled before the Lord? No, soon after the Hebrew children departed, he forgot the severe afflictions that came upon them. When the affliction is over, his anger is kindled again—kindled, not only against the Hebrew children, but against God.

How clear it is that man needs the work of the Spirit to make a heart of stone, a heart of flesh. This is the heart God speaks of in Ezekiel 36:26—"A new heart also will I give you, and a new spirit will I put within you: and I will take away the stony heart out of your flesh, and I will give you an heart of flesh." As covenant children, as children under the Word of grace, let us pray for this heart.

A Prayer for Kings

Among the rulers of the world, the heart of Pharaoh is not unique. There are many whose hearts are just as hard, who afflict the children of God. What should we do? Paul gives good direction to Timothy, when he writes, "I exhort therefore, that, first of all, supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks, be made for all men; for kings, and for all that are in authority; that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty. For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour" (1 Timothy 2:1–3).

What should we pray for? We should pray that our leaders have their eyes opened. We should pray that they have their hearts softened. We should pray that they "fear the Lord," for this "is the beginning of wisdom."

God's Patience

In these chapters, we notice something incredible. We notice a people severely oppressed, delivered by the Lord, and then complaining time nd time again. Sad as it is, this spirit can at times arise in the hearts of God's people. God is worthy of something other than complaining. Yet, is it not remarkable that God is faithful and steadfast in their weakness and wavering?

What does this reveal? It reveals that the deliverance that God's people receive is never by their merit, but always by grace. How quickly the hand of the Lord is forgotten. Yet Moses speaks words of truth and comfort: "Fear ye not, stand still, and see the salvation of the LORD, which he will show to you to day:...The LORD shall fight for you" (Exodus 14:13–14).

Moses' faith is a faith in exercise. It is a faith that sees not the circumstances surrounding him, but the God whose hand is over the circumstances.
