

### Lesson 33

### Keeping the Law: Not to Merit but to Show Thankfulness The Book of Exodus, chapters 18 through 24

#### **Memory Verse**

"And God spake all these words, saying, I am the LORD thy God, which have brought thee out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage."

Exodus 20:1-2

#### **God's Goodness and Mercy**

The Ten Commandments given by God are a display of his goodness and mercy. In Paradise, there was no need for the commandments to be written on tables of stone, for the law of God was written on their heart. However, when Adam transgressed the command of God and ate of the fruit of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, the image of God in Adam, whereby man knew the law in his heart, became corrupt. We see how the knowledge of the law has completely deteriorated by the wickedness of the first world, the wickedness that followed upon a renewed world after the flood, and even when we look at the world around us today.

How many disregard the commandments of God in their daily life? How often are the commands of God cast aside? How much better it would be if in this life people took the commands of God to heart and sought to live by them, even in an outward way. Much of the misery, suffering, and sorrow of this life are caused by forsaking God's commands, rather than keeping of them.

There are three views of the law, which we would like to look at in this lesson:

- The law as a covenant of works.
- The law as the fruit of God's gracious dealings.
- The law as a teacher.

#### Not a Covenant of Works

There are many people who misunderstand the Ten Commandments as they are revealed in Exodus chapter 20. To them they are a rule and pattern that they seek to live by, believing that if they do so, God will deliver them for their well-doing. They look upon their good works as the ground of their salvation. That is like the covenant of works.

The covenant of works was given to Adam and Eve in the garden of Eden. The covenant of works proved faulty when Adam and Eve broke the covenant by eating of the fruit of the tree of knowledge of good and evil. In that day, their nature and the nature of all Adam's posterity

became corrupt. It is for that reason that we know it is impossible to merit God's favor by our own works: "Therefore by the deeds of the law there shall no flesh be justified in his sight: for by the law is the knowledge of sin: (Romans 3:20).

Having broken the covenant of works, God brought forth a better covenant—the covenant of grace. This covenant is unbreakable, for the head of this covenant is Jesus Christ. In this covenant, every believer's salvation is secure in Christ's perfect obedience and righteousness: "But now hath he obtained a more excellent ministry, by how much also he is the mediator of a better covenant, which was established upon better promises" (Hebrews 8:6).

The first revelation of this covenant appeared in Genesis 3:15, when God promised that he would put enmity between Satan and the woman, and between the seed of Satan and the woman's seed: "I will put enmity between thee [the serpent, Satan] and the woman, and between thy seed and her see; it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his heal" (Genesis 3:15). It has continued from that moment, and is the thread that runs throughout the whole Bible.

#### **Right Keeping: Evidence of God's Gracious Dealings**

For the believer, the law of God is not kept to merit salvation. He is already saved. He endeavors to keep the law to show his thankfulness to God, who has graciously delivered him from all his sins by grace through faith in Jesus Christ. In John 8, we have an account of a woman who was a sinner. She was "taken in adultery" (John 8:3). Notice that Jesus does not require her to stop sinning before he forgives her. No, he first says, "Neither do I condemnn thee." After this, he says, "Go, and sin no more" (John 8:11). The grace she received was free. The change comes after and is an expression of a thankful heart.

We see this same order in the Ten Commandments found in Exodus chapter 20. The preamble to the Ten Commandments is especially important. Many people see the Ten Commandments as a covenant of works because they neglect the preamble and jump right to the commandments. However, if we are to rightly understand God's Word, then we should not leap over portions of God's Word.

If you read the preamble, you will see that Israel's deliverance is not dependent upon their keeping the law. God does not say to Israel, "Keep my commandments, and I will deliver you from Egypt." No, in fact, it is the complete opposite. He says, I "have brought thee out of the land of Egypt out of the house of bondage" (Exodus 20:2), therefore, keep my commandments. Thus we see that deliverance is not dependent upon works, but the works show the gratitude for deliverance.

#### **Right Keeping: Evidence**

As we have seen the law plays a role in the gratitude of a believer. However, it also plays a role in the life of a sinner. That role is to show him his sins and his need of a savior. It is for this reason that Paul wrote, "The law was our school master to bring us unto Christ, that we might be justified by faith. But after that faith is come, we are no longer under a schoolmaster. For ye are

all the children of God by faith in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:24–26).
