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

Lesson 41

The Serpent of Brass Lifted Up Numbers 21

Memory Verse

"And the LORD said unto Moses, Make thee a fiery serpent, and set it upon a pole: and it shall come to pass, that every one that is bitten, when he looketh uon it, shall live"

Numbers 21:9

Nicodemus

If you have read Numbers 21, you may have noticed that Nicodemus's name is not mentioned one time in the chapter. Perhaps you wondered why a section of a lesson on the book of Numbers would be titled "Nicodemus." Isn't Nicodemus a person in the New Testament? Yes, he is. What then does Nicodemus have to do with the history of the brazen serpent?

Nicodemus has a lot to do with the history of the brazen serpent. If you recall what the New Testament tells us about Nicodemus, you remember that he came to Jesus by night. He praised Jesus, for being a great teacher. Jesus, however, said that this was not enough. He said, "ye must be born again" (John 3:3). Not understanding what Jesus meant, or how it was possible to be born again, Nicodemus asked Jesus a question, "How can a man be born when he is old? can he enter the second time into his mother's womb, and be born?" (John 3:4). In the discussion that follows, Jesus explains many things. However, as he concludes his words with Nicodemus, Jesus points to Numbers 21 saying, "And as whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have eternal life" (John 3:14–15). Jesus uses this event in Old Testament history to show how it is possible to be born again by looking unto Jesus.

Let us look more closely at Numbers 21.

A Disobedient and Dying People

Disobedience is the cause of death. Remember Adam? What happened when he disobeyed God? Cast out from the Garden, did he not die in that day? Did he not die spiritually? – Yes, he lost communion and fellowship with God. Did he not die physically? – Yes, his body began to decay and after 930 years, he died. (Genesis 5:5) And what of an eternal death? Thankfully, Adam was restored. He was restored by believing God's promise concerning a savior (Genesis 3:15). In

believing, he was restored spiritually and never experienced eternal death. The same is true for all those "that love his appearing"—"Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing" (2 Timothy 4:8).

In Numbers 21, we find a disobedient people, a complaining people, a rebellious people. What do they say? Here are the awful words they spoke against God and his anointed servant Moses: "Wherefore have ye brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? for there is no bread, neither is there any water; and our soul loatheth this light bread" (Numbers 21:5). They did not like the Lord's way of deliverance. They did not like the Lord's servant Moses. How many in our day are like the Israelites, speaking out against the Lord, against his way of salvation, against his anointed.

What was the consequence of their rebellion? Death! Bitten by "fiery serpents," the people had poison coursing through their veins. Death! was nigh. Death! was at the door. The situation reminds us of our first parents. It is the situation of all those who are outside of Christ—"For our God is a consuming fire" (Hebrews 12:29).

A Merciful Cure

The people, awakened to their terrible condition, confessed their guilt: "We have sinned, for we have spoken against the LORD, and against thee" (Numbers 21:7). The Lord, hearing Moses interceding for the people, has Moses make a brazen (brass) serpent and raise it up on a pole. What must have been the thought of the people when they saw Moses make the brazen serpent? Is this the cure? How many were not saved because they despised the cure! How many will not believe in Jesus, because he was hung on a cross, between to malefactors, like a common criminal?

It was not enough that a way of salvation be made. The way of salvation—the message of salvation—must be proclaimed. It must be raised up, but it is not enough. The attention of the people must be drawn to the serpent on the pole. They must be encouraged to look upon the serpent with a faithful word from a faithful God. The cure is not a work, but a look: "It came to pass, that if a serpent had bitten any man, when he beheld the serpent of brass, he lived" (Numbers 21:9).

Were all those bitten by the fiery serpents delivered? No. While the serpent was raised up above the head of the crowd, so that all could see, only those who looked upon it, by faith, were delivered from the poison. Those who did not look, did not receive deliverance.

This brazen serpent points to the work of Jesus Christ. It is gospel (good news), which finds its fulness in Jesus Christ.
