

Lesson 73

Elisha Begins His Work

The Second Book of the Kings, chapters 1 thru 5, and the Second Book of Chronicles, chapter 20

Memory Verse

"Elijah said unto Elisha, Ask what I shall do for thee, before I be taken away from thee. And Elisha said, I pray thee, let a double portion of thy spirit be upon me."

2 Kings 2:9b

Historical Summary

When Ahab died, his son Ahaziah reigned in his stead. Like his parents, he was a wicked man who did not serve the true God. One of his first acts as king was to seek revenge on the Moabites who refused to pay tribute to Israel as they did when Ahab was living. But Ahaziah was prevented from going to war by an accident in which he received some severe injuries. Anxious to know whether he would recover from his injuries, he sent his servants to inquire of the god of the Ekronites for him. But on their way, they met Elijah who told them that Ahaziah would die. In-



stead of submitting, Ahaziah became angry and sent a captain with 50 soldiers to arrest Elijah. But fire came down from heaven to consume them. Another captain with 50 was sent, and the same thing happened to them. A third group was sent, but they trembled before Elijah and asked for mercy. Elijah therefore went with them to Ahaziah, and told him face to face that he would die. A few days later Ahaziah died.

When the time came for Elijah to leave this earth, Elisha followed him from place to place—he did not want him to leave. He

followed his master first to Bethel, then to Jericho, and finally to the Jordan River. Fifty sons of the prophets watched as Elijah struck the waters of Jordan with his mantle (his cape), and the waters parted. So Elijah and Elisha walked over on dry land, and Elijah said to him, "Ask what I shall do for thee, before I be taken away from thee." Elisha asked for a double portion of Elijah's spirit. As they walked, a chariot of fire with horses of fire appeared and separated them, and Elisha watched as Elijah was taken up into heaven by a whirlwind. He cried out, tore his clothes, and

picked up Elijah's mantle from the ground. He went back to the Jordan and struck the waters with the mantle, and the waters parted, so he crossed back over. When he returned to Bethel, a group of little children mocked him. Elisha cursed them, and the Lord sent two bears from the woods who tore them to death. It became clear to all that God was with Elisha, and he did many great works.

When Ahaziah died, his brother Joram reigned in his stead. One of his first efforts was to try to regain control over the Moabites because they rebelled against Israel after Ahab died. He asked for help from Jehoshaphat king of Judah and from the king of Edom. Jehoshaphat prayed for help from the Lord. But as the three armies approached Moab, they ran out of water and did not know what to do. So they asked Elisha, and he said Israel would win. The Lord provided water and also a victory over their enemies.

The Lord was with Elisha and helped him in his important work. He gave a poor woman a miraculous supply of oil so she could buy food. He was provided a place to rest in the home of a Shunamite woman, and later, when her only son died, he raised him to life. He cured poisonous food so that a large gathering had enough to eat. All these events made it clear to all that the Lord was with Elisha, and that they should listen to his teaching. These events also provided opportunities for the people to learn spiritual lessons.

The Lord also used Elisha to heal Naaman, a Syrian captain who had leprosy. A young Hebrew slave girl told him there was a prophet in Israel who could cure him, so he went to find Elisha. Elisha told him to go and wash in the Jordan river seven times. At first, Naaman scoffed at this instruction, but his servants encouraged him to try. Sure enough, when he followed Elisha's directions, he was cured. That's when Naaman the Syrian came to believe that the God of the Israelites was the one true God.

The Gospel in the Old Testament

Leprosy in Old Testament Israel was an awful disease, which meant a slow, agonizing, and painful death. It required a miracle to be healed of leprosy. So this disease also had some important lessons in it. We are all infected with sin, which leads to death. But the Lord Jesus Christ has provided a miraculous way to be set free from sin. He alone can provide forgiveness and deliverance from the bondage of sin. He can give you a new heart and a new nature which makes us fight against sin and seek holiness and righteousness. The wages of sin is death, but the penalty has been paid on Calvary's cross and a way opened for poor and needy sinners to be saved. This is what the Israelites needed in Old Testament times, and this is what we all need today. Have you come to the Lord Jesus Christ for forgiveness and deliverance yet?
