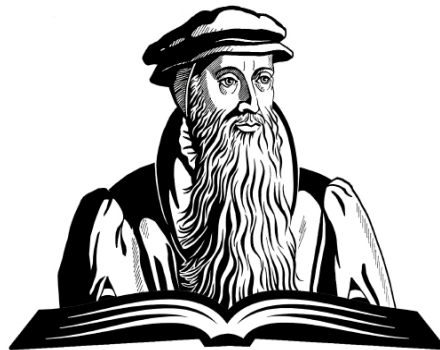

Lesson 80

Isaiah's Vision and Song

The Book of the Prophet Isaiah, chapters 7 through 66

Memory Verse

“But he was wounded for our transgression, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed.”
—Isaiah 53:5

The Book of Isaiah

The prophecy of Isaiah is sometimes called a Bible within a Bible. It has 66 chapters, the same number as the amount of books in the Bible. There are 39 books in the Old Testament and 27 books in the New Testament. The book of Isaiah is also divided into two sections, the first having 39 chapters and the second part having 27 chapters. In chapters 1–39, Isaiah must pronounce God’s judgments upon the people of Judah for turning their backs to the Lord. The Holy Spirit uses the proclamation of God’s righteousness and justice to make guilty sinners feel their need for God’s mercy and salvation. Then, in chapters 40–66, Isaiah may pass on precious promises of deliverance through Jesus Christ.

Isaiah, Chapter 7

The prophecies of the coming Messiah are not limited to the second half of the book of Isaiah.



Already in chapter seven, we read of a glorious promise made to a haughty king and a despairing people. Although King Ahaz refused when God gave him permission to ask for a sign to confirm God’s faithfulness, Isaiah may tell the king and the people of Judah that the Lord will give a sign nonetheless: “A virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel,” which means “God with us.” The people of Judah will not be destroyed, because at God’s time his dear Son will take the human nature by being born of a virgin, so that unworthy and unwilling sinners can be saved and reconciled to God.

Isaiah, Chapters 9 and 11

Reading through the prophecy of Isaiah, we find many other precious promises of the coming Messiah. In Isaiah 9:6 we read: “For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given.” The Son of God shall come unto us, come among us, and come for us, as we read in John 1:14: “The Word was made flesh and dwelt among us.” In Isaiah 11:1, Isaiah prophesies how the Lord Jesus shall be born as a rod out of the stem of Jesse. At a time when the house of David will be at its lowest

point, it shall be revived by the birth of the King of kings.

Prophecies of Christ's Suffering and Death

The suffering and death of the Saviour is vividly described in Isaiah 50:6, and all of Isaiah 52:13 through Isaiah 53:12. In great detail, Isaiah explained how God's Son would put off his glory in order to become a man with no outward beauty, one who would be despised, wounded, and even cut off from the land of the living. Yet his burial would be honourable. He would be without any deceit and violence, the Lamb without blemish which all the sacrifices pointed to. In this way Christ would bear the iniquities of many, making intercession for transgressors.

The Book of Isaiah in the New Testament

Because of these and many other texts pointing to the coming Christ, the book of Isaiah is frequently quoted by the Lord Jesus Himself. In Luke 4, we read how the Lord Jesus visited the synagogue at Nazareth, where he read Isaiah chapter 61, verses 1 and 2, and he explained that Isaiah's prophecy was being fulfilled that very moment in their presence. The Gospel writers, the book of Acts, Paul and Peter in their epistles, and John in the book of Revelation all refer to the book of Isaiah multiple times.

As you read this beautiful inspired book, you may find it hard to put down. As you are reading it, or any other part of God's Word, remember to do so with a prayer that the Holy Spirit may apply the message of judgment and salvation to your heart personally. How precious the Savior will become to you then!
