Lesson 87

The Three Friends in the Fiery Furnace

The Book of Daniel, chapter 3

Memory Verse

"When thou passest through the waters, I will be with thee; and through the rivers, they shall not overflow thee: when thou walkest through the fire, thou shalt not be burned; neither shall the flame kindle upon thee."—Isaiah 43:2

The Image of Gold

In chapter 2, we read how Nebuchadnezzar dreamed of a great image with a head of gold. In chapter 3, we also read of a great image, this one a real one constructed at the command of the king in the plain of Dura outside of Babylon. We don't know if the shape was similar to the image the king had seen in his dream, but in one way it was different. Not only the head, but the entire image was made of gold. Perhaps Nebuchadnezzar, filled with pride because of all his recent victories, was proclaiming to all that his kingdom would indeed last forever. All the important rulers and officials from all the conquered territories were ordered to come to the plain for a huge dedication feast in honor of the statue, which may have represented Bel, the chief god of Babylon. Then came the grand moment of the feast. As soon as the band started playing, everyone gathered in the plain united together in falling down and worshiping the image. Everyone except for three men.

Refusing to Bow

At the end of Daniel chapter 2, we read that Daniel's three friends, Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego—their Babylonian names—had received important positions in the province of Babylon. Therefore they could not refuse to attend. They listened to the instructions given by the king's herald, and saw the fiery furnace which the herald pointed out would be the fate of anyone who refused to join in worshiping the image. Why did they not bow? Their important positions allowed them to do much good for their own people. Should they throw away their lives and their good influence? Surely God would know that in their hearts they would never serve anyone but him.

When they were brought before the king, Nebuchadnezzar even gave them a second chance! However, the three friends did not waver. They said to the king, "We are not careful to answer thee in this matter." They did not feel the need to explain or excuse themselves. Bowing to the image would clearly be a sin against God's commandments. No threats or promises could change their mind about obeying the God they loved. "Our God whom we serve is able to deliver us from the burning fiery furnace," they said, "But if not, be it known unto thee, O king, that we will not serve thy gods, nor worship the golden image which thou hast set up." Probably no one had ever stood up to the proud king in this way before. With his face contorted with rage, Nebuchadnezzar ordered

the furnace to be heated seven times hotter. It became so hot that in the act of throwing the three friends into the furnace, the servants of the king were themselves killed by the terrible heat.

Saved from the Fiery Furnace

Nebuchadnezzar was content. No one would challenge his authority after this! But he was in for the biggest shock of his life. God would make clear to the proud king and all his subjects that "the Most High ruleth," and "all the inhabitants of the earth are reputed as nothing" (Daniel 4:32, 35). When Nebuchadnezzar looked into the fiery furnace sometime later, he saw moving figures! To his astonishment he realized it was Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego walking in the fire unharmed. And he also saw a fourth figure, who looked like the Son of God! "Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, ye servants of the most high God, come forth," the astonished king cried out. How people must have crowded around the three friends after they came out. No hair was singed! There was not even the smell of smoke! No wonder the deeply impressed king cried out, "Blessed be the God of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, who had sent his angel, and delivered his servants that trusted in him." The feast which was intended for the honor of the god of Nebuchadnezzar, ended in honor of the God of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego—the Lord God Almighty.

What a great demonstration of love and faithfulness to God! Do you have such love and faithfulness which would enable you to make a bold stand for the Lord? Peter's denial of his Master in the hall of Caiaphas clearly shows us that we can never do so in our own strength, but only when the Holy Spirit fills us with that love. Notice the boldness of the same Peter at the feast of Pentecost. The Lord Jesus said, "How much more shall your heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to them that ask him" (Luke 11:13).
