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

Lesson 92 Ezra - Return from Captivity The Book of Ezra, chapters 1 through 3

Memory Verse

"This is the word of the LORD unto Zerubbabel, saying, Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the LORD of hosts." Zechariah 4:6

<u>The Return</u>

Seventy years of captivity had passed, and it was time for the new Persian King Cyrus to fulfill the prophecy of Isaiah 45:1, where God addresses king Cyrus long before he was born: "Thus saith the Lord to his anointed, to Cyrus, whose right hand I have holden, to subdue nations before him... For Jacob my servant's sake, and Israel mine elect, I have even called thee by thy name." In both 2 Chronicles 36:22-23 and Ezra 1:1-3, we read the dramatic proclamation of King Cyrus: "*Who is there among you of all His people? His God be with him, and let him go up to Jerusalem, which is in Judah, and build the house of the Lord God of Israel*"

When God delivered His people from Egypt, they were being severely oppressed. They all longed to be delivered, but Pharaoh would not let them go. When it was God's time to deliver His people from Babylon, conditions were very different. God had been gracious to them during their captivity. Many of them owned homes, land, farms or businesses in Babylon. In old Persian records we read that some Jews had become very wealthy.

The leaders organizing the return were Zerubbabel, the grandson of former King Jehoiachin, and Joshua, the grandson of the last high priest. We can imagine the kind of objections raised at the meetings which were held: "My crops are nearly ripe." "My business is prospering." "Isn't it a long and dangerous trip?" "What will we find there, isn't everything destroyed?" "We have synagogues here too, where we may serve God." "We would be under the same king there as here."

<u>Consider</u>

Why did anyone return at all? God who had stirred up the spirit of Cyrus to give them permission to go, also stirred up the spirits of His people to leave everything they had gotten in Babylon, and return to the land of their fathers (Ezra 1:5). God filled the hearts of many of the Jews with love for God, for His house, and for the promised Messiah who must be born in that land. Nearly 50,000 Jews, mostly from the tribe of Judah and Benjamin, as well as thousands of priests and Levites, carrying with them the temple treasures which had been returned, began the dangerous and difficult journey across the desert. What a moving moment it must have been when after months of travel, they set foot in the land of their fathers, and when they saw the ruins of Jerusalem and the other towns.

Beginning to Rebuild

After finding the fields and farms of their forefathers, every family began the task of rebuilding. The priests and Levites did not sit still either. Seven months later, when all the returned Jews gathered at Jerusalem for the Day of Atonement and the feast of Tabernacles, they saw piles of lumber and hewn stone laying ready. The Temple Mount had been cleared of rubble and leveled, and in the center of the open space stood an altar. What a solemn moment it must have been when all the assembled Jews watched the high priest approach with a lamb, the first offering after the destruction of the temple. As the sacrifice burned and the choirs sang, the hearts of the people must have been filled with joy and wonder at the goodness of God, their God.

<u>The Gospel in the Old Testament</u>

"Who is there among you of all His people? His God be with him, and let him go up to Jerusalem," King Cyrus had announced. As they stood around the altar, how glad and thankful the assembled Israelites were that the Lord had stirred up their hearts to go. Matthew Henry says: "The calls and offers of the gospel are like the proclamation of Cyrus. Those bound under the power of sin may be made free by Jesus Christ; Jesus Christ has opened the way for them. Many that hear this joyful sound choose to sit still in Babylon, but some break through all discouragements, whatever it cost them. They are those whose spirit God has made willing. Thus will the heavenly Canaan be filled, though many perish in Babylon. The gospel offer will not have been made in vain."
