## *Lesson 93* Ezra - Return from Captivity The Book of Ezra, chapters 3 through 6

#### **Memory Verse**

"Who art thou, O great mountain? before Zerubbabel thou shalt become a plain: and he shall bring forth the headstone thereof with shoutings, crying, Grace, grace unto it." - Zechariah 4:7

#### **Rebuilding the Temple**

By the second month of the second year after their return from Babylon, enough timber had arrived from Tyre and Sidon, and enough stones had been carried from the quarries, so that Joshua, and Zerubbabel, and the Levites of twenty years and older, together with the masons and carpenters, could begin the work of rebuilding the temple. When the foundation was completed, the builders paused to thank the Lord. Everyone gathered at the site. The priests and Levites put on their white garments and played their trumpets and cymbals. A loud cheer went up among the young builders. They felt God's favor, and could not help shouting with joy. However, we read that there were also some who wept! There were some very old Jews who still remembered the Temple of Solomon. Looking at this modest foundation, they remembered the size and magnificence of that temple, and the terrible day when that had all gone up in flames.

#### A Tempting Offer

The builders continued undeterred. One day, a group of men rode up and offered to help. "Let us build with you, for we seek your God, as ye do," they said. This was a tempting offer. In Ezra 3:3, we read that "fear was upon them because of the people of those countries." Any sign of friendship would have been welcomed with open arms, we might think. Thankfully, God gave Zerubbabel and the other leaders wisdom to foresee what the consequences would be if they accepted their help. These men were Samaritans, the descendents of the Assyrian and Babylonian people, who had moved into the depopulated country of the ten tribes, and married with the poor Israelites who had remained. The religion of the Samaritans became a strange mixture. The colonists added the worship of the Lord to the worship of their own idols. In II Kings 17:41, we read: "So these nations feared the LORD, and served their graven images...unto this day." The leaders of the Jews realize how dangerous it would be to unite with these people in the worship of the Lord.

#### **Opposition and Setbacks**

In chapter 4, we read how the Samaritans now showed their true colors. In every possible way they began to obstruct the building of the temple. When a new king ascended the throne of the Persian Empire, the Samaritans sent him alarming reports about the Jews of sedition and rebellion, and succeeded in convincing the king to halt all building at Jerusalem. What a discouragement this

must have been! For sixteen years, all work stopped. The half-finished temple was more and more forgotten.

#### The Temple Completed

With every year that went by, the thought of ever completing the temple must have seemed more impossible. What could motivate the leaders and the people to resume their task? Only the Word of the Lord could do this. God sent two prophets who urged and encouraged the people of Judah to put the cause of the Lord before their own concerns. By these prophets, the Lord "stirred up the spirit" of Zerubbabel and Joshua, "and the spirit of all the remnant of the people" (Haggai 1:14). When the people began to build once again, the Lord inclined the heart of the Persian king to give new orders: no one was allowed to hinder the builders, and expenses would be paid for by government funds!

Four years later, the temple was completed. How the Jews must have rejoiced! "The children of Israel... kept the dedication of this house of God with joy" (Ezra 6:16). Indeed, "the Lord had made them joyful" (Ezra 6:22). If you have ever experienced the joy of undeserved salvation, or even the joy of feeling that the Lord takes notice of you, you know how this joy thrills you, and deeply humbles you at the same time. This joy runs deeper than any other possible joy on earth.
