# Lesson 95 Nehemiah - Rebuilding the Walls The Book of Nehemiah, chapters 1 through 3

**Memory Verse** 

"Except the Lord build the house, they labour in vain that build it: except the LORD keep the city, the watchman waketh but in vain." - Psalm 127:1

#### Sad News

In the book of Nehemiah, we meet with another high-ranking Jew whom the Lord used to help his people. Nehemiah was a cupbearer at the court of King Artaxerxes in Shushan, in charge of serving wine to the king. About thirteen years after Ezra returned to Jerusalem, Nehemiah was visited by his brother Hanani, who came all the way from Jerusalem to the capital city of Shushan. The news he brought from Jerusalem was not good. Although the temple was completed, the walls and gates were still in ruin, and the people of the city were exposed to the harassment and persecution of the Samaritans and other hostile neighbors.

#### <u>The King's Cupbearer</u>

Nehemiah's reaction shows his love for God's honor and God's people. Nehemiah "wept and mourned certain days, and fasted and prayed before the God of heaven" (Nehemiah 1:4). While he was serving the king, Nehemiah could not hide his sorrow. When the king saw it, he asked to know the reason for it, so Nehemiah told him about the terrible state of God's people in Jerusalem. King Artaxerxes asked him "For what dost thou make request?" So Nehemiah prayed first, then he boldly asked for permission to go to Jerusalem to rebuild the walls. Nehemiah also asked for letters of protection and permission to cut timber from the king's forest. And the king agreed, "according to the good hand of my God upon me," he writes (Nehemiah 2:8).

#### An Introduction

Nehemiah arrived safely in Jerusalem accompanied by the king's captains and horsemen. He gave the king's letters to the governors, and reports that Sanballat, the governor, and Tobiah the Ammonite were grieved that someone came to help the Jews. He waited a few days, then he went out quietly at night to inspect the walls. After seeing the ruins for himself, he called the rulers of the city and introduced himself. He showed the king's letters and told them how God had guided him there to help rebuild the walls. Nehemiah's offer was received with enthusiasm! Not only the people of Jerusalem, but also Jews from Jericho, Gibeon, Mizpah and other places flocked to Jerusalem to volunteer their time and skills. Nehemiah needed all his organizational skills to coordinate this huge task.

#### **Opposition**

Chapter four begins, "But it came to pass." When Sanballat the governor of Samaria saw the progress made on the wall, he became alarmed and angry. "It grieved them exceedingly that a man was come to seek the welfare of the children of Israel" (Neh. 2:10). As they rode along the wall, Sanballat and his men loudly ridiculed the builders and their efforts. Sanballat soon realized that Nehemiah was the driving force behind the rebuilding efforts. It was Nehemiah who encouraged the builders and organized everything. In various ways, Sanballat then tried to lure Nehemiah away from the city so that they could ambush and kill him. When this failed too, Sanballat asked the help of the Ammonites, the Arabians and the Philistines and agreed on a time when they would attack the city from all sides. By the Lord's blessing, Nehemiah was warned. He quickly organized an effective defence, which caused the enemies to withdraw.

#### **Depending on the Lord**

Nehemiah was clearly a gifted man, the right man at the right time for the task. As we read the book of Nehemiah, we notice how Nehemiah boldly and decisively took the needed measures. We also notice that he generously gives credit, and in chapter 3 mentions by name all the men and women who helped in any way. As Nehemiah encouraged the builders, he continually pointed away from himself. "Remember the Lord, which is great and terrible, and fight for your brethren, your sons, and your daughters, your wives, and your houses" (Nehemiah 4:14). Nehemiah clearly felt his dependence upon the Lord, and we hear him time and again sighing in prayer, "Hear, O our God, for we are despised, and turn their reproach upon their own head" (Nehemiah 4:4). "Think upon me, my God, for good" (Nehemiah 5:19). "Remember me, O my God, concerning this also" (Nehemiah 13:22). Clearly Nehemiah had learned the truth of John 15:5, "Without me ye can do nothing," and Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me."
