

Scripture Text

"Amen." — Matthew 6, verse 13b

Key Points

- 1. Introduction: Amen is a comforting word at the end of this prayer.
 - a. Amen is a Hebrew word that means, "This shall be truly sure and certain."
- 2. "Amen" implies that we believe that God hears us when we pray.
 - a. The Lord Jesus teaches us, "Ask and it shall be given you; seek and you shall find."
 - b. Several examples in the Bible of God answering prayer.
 - c. Sometimes God answers prayer in unexpected ways.
- 3. "Amen" is also a call to faith.
 - a. We must examine ourselves to know if we are trusting in the Lord in true faith.
 - b. There is such a thing as false faith, trusting in other things, which is related to idolatry.
 - 1) Examples from Scripture of false faith.
 - c. We must learn to exercise true faith in God; it can be difficult.
 - d. Examples of how Jesus calls us to true faith.
- 4. "Amen" is a call to pray in agreement with God's will.
 - a. We should be focused on God's honor.
 - b. We should be focused on the extension of God's kingdom.
 - c. We should plead God's power when we pray.

- 5. "Amen" is a call to trust in God and persevere in praying.
 - a. Be encouraged; God is faithful to answer.
 - 1) Examples of things we need to pray for.
- 6. "Amen" is also a call to be truly thankful for all of God's benefits in Jesus Christ.
- 7. We need the help of the Holy Spirit to pray rightly, with a humble attitude.
- 8. The final "Amen" will sound one day.
