

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



Introduction: Driver's seat analogy

# I. The Husband's Position: Headship—Ephesians 5, verse 23

- a. Christ pictured as bridegroom in Old and New Testaments.
- b. Husband's headship inescapable—Ephesians 5, verse 23
- c. Husband's headship represents God in the home -models the character of God to his wife and family.
- d. Husbands themselves subject to the headship of Christ-1 Corinthians 11, verse 3
- e. Husband's relationship to his Head influences relationship to his wife-
- f. Husband ordained to be governor of his home since before the fall—proof:
- 1. Headship is a divine calling:
  - a. parallel example in the authority given to office bearers
- 2. When headship is not recognized by the wife, husbands may take offence for Christ's sake: may not react in pride and self centeredness.

## II. The husband's pursuit: to love his wife

- 1. Ephesians 5, verses 25, 28, 33
- 2. Colossians 3, verse 19
  - a. The temptations leading to neglect of this pursuit
    - i. Temptation of bitterness-Colossians 2, verse 19
    - contrast with Christ's willingness to forgive-
    - ii. Temptation to be busy with other things
  - b. Husband is to love his wife as Christ loved the Church. How does He love?
    - 1. He set His love on His people—Deuteronomy 7, verse 7
    - 2. He loved the unlovable—Romans 5, verses 8, 6, 10
    - 3. He cherishes the bride—Zephaniah 3, verse 17
    - 4. He is always attentive-
    - 5. His love makes His bride beautiful—Ephesians 5
    - 6. The husband is to praise his wife—Proverbs 31, verse 28; Psalm 45
  - c. Husband to support wife as weaker vessel
    - to look upon her with compassion
    - to nurture her
  - d. Husband needs to continue learning about his wife—1 Peter 3, verse 7 Discussions with the purpose of getting to know her better can include:
    - 1. biblical doctrine
    - 2. the home

3. children

- 4. responsibilities
- 5. her family and friends
- 6. areas of Christian service
- 7. how you could be a better father and husband
- 8. her struggles and feelings
