<u>Lecture Title</u>: Trust Me Only

Kev Text:

"Thou shalt have no other gods before me."—Exodus 20, verse 3

Summary:

In this module, Pastor Vergunst introduces a general principle for each commandment. The first is a basic one, stating that the Ten Commandments are the foundational and fundamental law of God, for all people at all times. Though God gave the Ten Commandments specifically to the Israelites, it was intended indeed to be his will for all people. Then we learn what God's basic intent is for the First Commandment, and also what God commands and forbids in this commandment.
