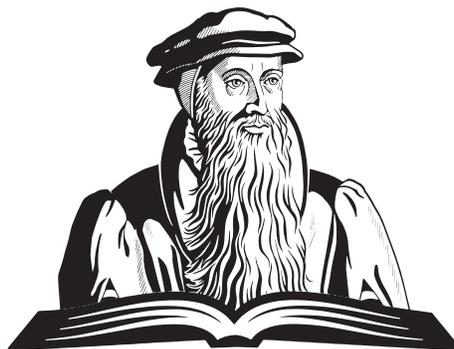

Lesson 4

A Gracious Promise

Genesis 3

Memory Verse

And I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed; it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his heel.

Genesis 3:15

The Fall

The most disastrous event in the history of mankind is told to us in Genesis 3. After God had created the world, placed man in the midst of the Garden and gave our first parents the freedom to enjoy the fruits of the Garden, our first parents transgressed against the clear command of God. Despite all the freedom they had, they chose to eat of the one tree that God had forbade them to eat. This act of disobedience turned light into darkness, life into death, freedom into slavery, joy into sorrow. The effect of this act of disobedience was felt not only by Adam and Eve, but has rippled through time from generation to generation. We are all affected by original sin. Our actual sins are a consequence of their original sin. We can see the effects of the Fall all around us. Paul writes in Romans 3:9-12, “we have before proved both Jews and Gentiles, that they are all under sin; As it is written, There is none righteous, no, not one: There is none that understandeth, there is none that seeketh after God. They are all gone out of the way, they are together become unprofitable; there is none that doeth good, no, not one.”

Death

Regarding the Tree of Knowledge, God had commanded our first parents not to eat of its fruit. He also warned them of the terrible consequences that would follow – “the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die” (Genesis 2:17). This was the effect of sin. Adam and Eve did die that day. They died

- Spiritually – immediately upon eating the fruit, they lost communion and the favor of God.
- Physically – over time man would age and perish.
- Eternally – this is the death that awaits all those who are not reconciled to God, through Jesus Christ.

Life

How terrible was the situation where Adam and Eve found themselves. There was nothing that they could do to make things right with God. However, God would not leave them without hope. When they were afraid, when they hid, when they tried to cover their shame with fig leaves, God came with the first proclamation of the gospel. That He [God] would “put enmity ... between thy seed and her seed” (Genesis 3:15). God would provide a means by which Adam, Eve, and their posterity could come again into God’s favor. It is, as Paul says, “by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God” (Ephesians 2:8).
