

Lesson 15

Lessons from Lot's Life

Genesis 18:16-33 – Genesis 19

Memory Verse

Haste thee, escape thither; for I cannot do anything till thou be come thither. Therefore the name of the city was called Zoar.

Genesis 19:22

Lot's Troubles

We know from the Bible that Lot was a child of God. When the Lord came to destroy the wicked in the city of Sodom, Lot was spared. God would not “destroy the righteous with the wicked” (Genesis 18:23). Because Lot had found grace, God would not do to Lot what He did to the wicked. Oh! How great is the goodness and mercy of God. Sadly, despite God's goodness, Lot's life was not a God glorifying life.

At times troubles may come into our lives solely because we live in a fallen and sinful world. Sickness, disease, declining health, old age and death are all a consequence of the fall in Paradise. At other times, troubles may come because the world hates those that love the Lord. “If the world hate you, ye know that it hated me before it hated you” (John 15:18). And yet at other times troubles may come into our lives because, despite the grace and the goodness of God, we make bad choices. How different things might have been if the words of Paul were in Lot's heart – “grieve not the holy Spirit of God, whereby ye are sealed unto the day of redemption” (Ephesians 4:30). What a blessing if those words would live in our hearts.

What was it that caused so much trouble in the life of Lot? How many troubles came into Lot's life because he chose to live in Sodom? He was taken captive. His daughters married Sodomites. His sons-in-law mocked him. He lost all his possessions. His wife became a pillar of salt. May the life of Lot be an example for us of how not to live! These troubles arose out of the bad choices Lot had made in his life. Living too close to the worldly was the cause of Lot's troubles. Peter tells us, “For that righteous man [Lot,] dwelling among [Sodom], ... vexed his righteous soul from day to day with their unlawful deeds” (II Peter 2:8).

God's Grace

What a life Lot lived! It was not a life lived in close communion with God. There was much of the world in his life. Yet, despite the waywardness of Lot, God would not let His own perish in the burning of Sodom. Why did God save Lot, when Lot did not live a God glorifying life? It is because salvation is "by grace...through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God" (Ephesians 2:8).

Since salvation is by grace and not of works, should we carelessly sin? Perhaps Paul may answer this question best. "Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid. How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein? (Romans 6:1-2). Remember, though Lot was saved, his life was a life full of misery. He "vexed his righteous soul from day to day" (II Peter 2:8).
