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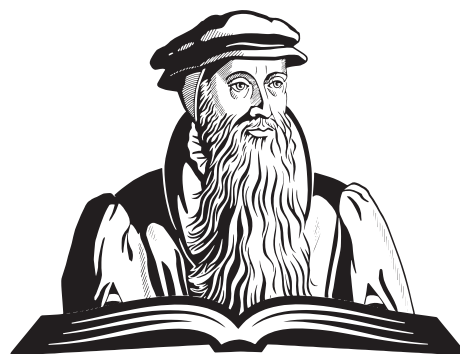

Genesis 42 – Genesis 45

Memory Verse

Now therefore be not grieved, nor angry with yourselves, that ye sold me hither: for God did send me before you to preserve life.

Genesis 45:5

A Story of Reconciliation

The events related in these chapters of Genesis are indeed beautiful. It is a story of brothers, once at enmity, brought together again in bonds of love. It is amazing to see how the brother they despised is the brother who embraces them. This picture, painted for us in Holy Scripture, is even more magnificent when we consider that it is an illustration of God, in Christ, reconciling a sinful people to Himself.

Not Satisfied

What was it that brought the children of Jacob to Egypt? It was not to search for the brother they had offended and despised. Rather it was a growing need for food. There was a famine in the land. However, they had heard news that, in Egypt, there was food in abundance. It is their need that drives them to Egypt, toward Joseph.

Conviction of Sin

They come to Egypt with great expectations. However, things don't go according to their plans. When they come before the presence of Zaphnath-paaneah, they are accused of being spies. These accusations cause the past sins of the brothers, their sin toward their brother Joseph, to come to the foreground. They recognize that they are being dealt with justly. They had transgressed the Law, and now they feel that the Law condemns them.

A Wonderfully Full and Free Deliverance

They came to Egypt with money in their sacks. They intended to pay for the grain they received. However, on their journey home they open the sacks of grain. And what do they find? Why, each man finds his money in the sack. They paid nothing for the grain.

After some time passed, it was necessary for Jacob's sons to return to Egypt. On their way home the second time, Zaphnath-paaneah's steward confronted them and accused them of stealing a cup. Upon their return, the cup is found in Benjamin's sack. What will the punishment be? He shall become a servant, a slave to Zaphnath-paaneah. What is the reaction of the brothers? Are they glad that it was not found in their sacks? Will they do to Benjamin what they did to Joseph? No, they confess their guilt – "what shall we speak? Or how shall we clear ourselves? God hath found out the iniquity of thy servants" (Genesis 44:16).

Upon hearing the confession of his brothers, what does Zaphnath-paaneah do? Why, he weeps. He reveals himself, not as Zaphnath-paaneah, but as Joseph, their brother. He embraced and "kissed all his brethren" (Genesis 45:15). That which had been prophesied concerning Joseph had come true. As second, only unto Pharaoh, all that Joseph had, he laid before his brothers. He would provide all things freely.

Discussion Questions

1. In the writing above, there are three sections: Not Satisfied, Conviction of Sin and A Wonderful and Free Deliverance. Explain how in these three headings is seen God's work of salvation and reconciliation.

2. When Jacob's sons came before Zaaphnath-paaneah, they said to him, "We are all one man's sons; we are true men, thy servants are no spies" (Genesis 42:11). Explain why their statement concerning their character was false.

3. Explain why Joseph did not reveal his true identity to his brothers immediately.

4. In Genesis 42:25, we read that Joseph “commanded” that “every man’s money” be placed in their sacks. As they journeyed home, the men found the money in their sacks and cried, “What is this that God hath done unto us? (Genesis 42:28). Explain how both these statements are true – that Joseph did it and that God did it.

5. Before going up to Egypt the second time, Judah said to his father that he would be a “surety” for Benjamin (Genesis 43:9). In Genesis 44:32-33, when Zaphnath-paaneah intends to make Benjamin a servant, for ‘stealing’ the cup, Judah intercedes for the child. What is a surety? How is Judah acting as a surety? How is this an illustration of Jesus Christ, the greater surety?
